in an era of rampant islamophobia what do literary representations of muslims and anti muslim bigotry tell us about changing concepts of cultural difference in islamophobia and the novel peter morey analyzes how recent works of fiction have framed and responded to the rise of anti muslim prejudice showing how their portrayals of muslims both reflect and refute the ideological preoccupations of media and politicians in the post 9 11 west islamophobia and the novel discusses novels embodying a range of positions from the avowedly secular to the religious and from texts that appear to underwrite western assumptions of cultural superiority to those that recognize and critique neoimperial impulses morey offers nuanced readings of works by john updike ian mcewan hanif kureishi monica ali mohsin hamid john le carré khaled hosseini azar nafisi and other writers emphasizing the demands of the literary marketplace for representations of muslims he explores how depictions of muslim experience have challenged liberal assumptions regarding the novel s potential for empathy and its ability to encompass a variety of voices morey argues for a greater degree of critical self consciousness in our understanding of writing by and about muslims in contrast to both exclusionary nationalism and the fetishization of difference contemporary literature s capacity to unveil the conflicted nature of anti muslim bigotry expands our range of resources to combat islamophobia this in turn might contribute to islamophobia s eventual dismantling

this book reveals fundamental connections between nationalist violence religious identity and the origins of the novel in the early modern period through fresh interpretations of music literature and history it argues that the expulsion of the muslim population created

a historic and artistic aperture that was addressed in new literary forms

does empathy felt while reading fiction actually cultivate a sense of connection leading to altruistic actions on behalf of real others empathy and the novel presents a comprehensive account of the relationships among novel reading empathy and altruism drawing on psychology narrative theory neuroscience literary history philosophy and recent scholarship in discourse processing keen brings together resources and challenges for the literary study of empathy and the psychological study of fiction reading empathy robustly enters into affective responses to fiction yet its role in shaping the behavior of emotional readers has been debated for three centuries keen surveys these debates and illustrates the techniques that invite empathetic response she argues that the perception of fictiveness increases the likelihood of readers empathy in part by releasing them from the guarded responses necessitated by the demands of real others narrative empathy is a strategy and subject of contemporary novelists from around the world writers who tacitly endorse the potential universality of human emotions when they call upon their readers empathy if narrative empathy is to be taken seriously keen suggests then women s reading and responses to popular fiction occupy a central position in literary inquiry and cognitive literary studies should extend its range beyond canonical novels in short keen s study extends the playing field for literature practitioners causing it to resemble more closely that wide open landscape inhabited by readers

the essay periodical and the novel both emerged as new literary genres in the eighteenth century yet there has been no full length study of the formative role each genre played in the development of the other this book uses the lens of periodical studies to reassess what we know about the history of prose fiction examining how periodicals shaped fictionality and how they were influenced by it in return it moves the

dial on studies of the english novel arguing that the vibrant interchange between these genres revolutionised the printed world over five chapters that contextualise key authors within london s cutthroat print marketplace the book studies the idea of print ecologies to explain the mutual dependence of the periodical and prose fiction disrupting the often held assumption that the novel emerges from this period sui generis

with the appearance of d a miller s remarkable book the victorian novel has its most dazzling critic in years miller s subject is not so much the police in fiction as fiction and policing narrative as a conservative function of the polis tracking diverse strategies of surveillance and incarceration into the confines of the fictional institution itself miller investigates victorian novels as the often unconscious agent of a disciplinary culture he thus reads fiction reading us keeping a public in its private place his mastery of an intricate layered and sinuous argument is stunning the writing no less than superb for all the book s overarching debt to foucault d a miller do the police in a voice all his own garrett stewart author of death sentences styles of dying in british fiction

this book examines the emergence of modern consciousness as consciousness develops historically in one cultural form prose fiction narrative the book represents a critical history of crisis arguably the most characterizing single word in the modern world and a major figuration or trope eugene hollahan has studied the history of this important word within the development of the english language novel from samuel richardson to saul bellow after establishing a heuristic model for such a critical history hollahan tracks the word characterized by george eliot in felix holt the radical as a great noun through two and a half centuries of narratives by major novelists with contextualizing excursions into discourses in related fields such as autobiography philosophy theology and social science hollahan contextualizes his study of english language narrative fiction by

examining the writings of crisis rhetoricians in the eighteenth century thomas paine nineteenth century thomas carlyle j s mill and j h newman and twentieth century karl barth edmund husserl t s kuhn and richard m nixon such varied and powerful crisis rhetorics establish a matrix of language and ideas for the crisis centered novels hollahan surveys these novels include major works by samuel richardson walter scott jane austen george eliot george meredith george gissing george moore d h lawrence e m forster james joyce lawrence durrell robert coover and saul bellow hollahan s description of the crisis trope interfaces with various critical issues such as canonical inclusion reader response and deconstruction on the whole his book acknowledges current critical issues but endeavors to remain basically a critical history it attempts to demonstrate that the crisis riddled modern world and the crisis conscious novel are analogous and coeval crisis begins as aristotle s term for logical plot structuring becomes longinus s term for emotional exacerbation and eventually enters into a variety of critical and narrative formulations matthew arnold s cultural centrality henry james s existential aestheticism lawrence s self defining sexuality marshall brown s revolutionary turning point paul de man s error ridden criticism floyd merrell s cut into the primordial flux durrell s reborn self and bellow s analysis of hysterical escapism broadly speaking hollahan argues that any crisis trope will enable or even necessitate a unique confluence of writerly and readerly skills in louis lambert balzac urged what a wonderful book one would write by narrating the life and adventures of a word the story hollahan narrates fulfills balzac s expectations as it depicts writer after writer working out influential representations of human life in terms of crisis consciousness centering upon george eliot s great noun crisis historically hollahan demonstrates such consciousness comes to define modern humanity book jacket title summary field provided by blackwell north america inc all rights reserved

this book fills a gap in existing scholarship on the history of the novel in relation to visual

culture by discussing the visual fascination that novelists such as Nathaniel Hawthorne, Herman Melville, Honoré de Balzac, and George Eliot show for several types of pre-cinematic spectacle. It also identifies a so far neglected aspect of novel theory that nineteenth-century authors elaborated by incorporating suggestions from pre-cinematic visual spectacles by shedding light on forms of visibility that were not entertained by the dominant aesthetic modes of painting and photography. *The Nineteenth Century Novel and the Pre-Cinematic Imagination* argues that the presence of nineteenth-century pre-cinematic optical illusions in works of fiction redefines the notion of mimesis as animated movement and points to a continuity between pre-cinema, the literary imagination, and the structures of knowledge production of the modern episteme.

Using the methods of Frankfurt School theorists Walter Benjamin and Theodor Adorno, David Suchoff offers new readings of Dickens, Melville, and Kafka that underscore the political and social critiques inherent in their novels. Suchoff's aim is to redeem the critical power of mass culture in the modern novel, and he argues that ideological battles fought in American literary criticism during the Cold War decades have limited our current interpretations of mass culture's critical force in political fiction. Suchoff demonstrates how the works of these nineteenth and early twentieth-century novelists were taken up into the Cold War literary canon and made to fit the arguments of American liberal critics for subversive fiction and of New Historicist critics for a contained modern novel. Applying Benjamin's redemptive criticism and Adorno's dialectical method, Suchoff's readings of Dickens, Melville, and Kafka show how the political problems posed by mass culture and audience for each writer became part of the dialectically critical grain of their most important social novels. He examines Dickens's struggle with Victorian taste and the relation of his work to advertising and other nonliterary forms; Melville's confrontations with popular ideologies of American expansion and race; and Kafka's concern with the

popular yiddish theater and jewish political movements throughout suchoff reveals the continuing importance of commodity culture in the novel tradition and the concurrent development of cultural criticism critical theory and the novel provides a useful introduction to benjamin and adorno and their uses in practical criticism it is also an illuminating study of the historical origins of literary theory and cultural criticism and a contribution to the expanding field of cultural studies

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
